To deliver on our mission – to support a healthy quality of life for seniors – Silver Key needs partnership with stakeholders. We are proud to engage with Bear Creek Garden Association (BCGA) which runs this garden, located in beautiful Bear Creek Regional Park, on the west side of Colorado Springs. It is the oldest community garden in the Pikes Peak region.

Individuals can rent plots to grow organic vegetables and because BCGA is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, gardeners may not sell their produce but instead are encouraged to plant extra vegetables and herbs to donate and give away to friends. Until the end of the season, gardeners will be donating produce to the Silver Key food pantry, the largest of its kind in southern Colorado.

## Food Insecurities Among the Senior Community

#### WHY SENIOR NUTRITION MATTERS

In Colorado, one in 10 seniors may not know when or where they will get their next meal. Often they must choose between purchasing food or paying for medications, housing and other basic needs. Nationally, only two out of every five eligible seniors are enrolled in SNAP, which further impacts food insecurity. The majority of seniors who do receive SNAP are very low income, with an average monthly income of just \$912. In Colorado, 25 percent of SNAP recipients are in households with seniors and/or people with disabilities.

#### FOOD SECURITY FOR SENIORS LEADS TO:

- Substantially lower rates of diabetes <sup>27</sup>
- Significantly lower rates of depression <sup>27</sup>
- Greater independence with fewer limitations on daily living activities 27
- Reduced rates of preventable hospitalizations 28
- Significantly reduced health care and Medicaid costs 28
- Lower rates of nursing home utilization 28

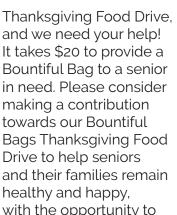

For many El Paso County residents, food pantries, Colorado Springs Food Rescue, and retail sties that accept Supplemental experience a joyful and **Nutrition Assistance** Program (SNAP) and Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) are the main sources of food.\*

This year alone, nearly 1,300 seniors utilized the Silver Key food pantry for their food source every month. It is therefore our goal to fill 1,300 bags for this year's Bountiful Bags and we need your help! It takes \$20 to provide a Bountiful Bag to a senior in need.
